

### **Initial Assessments**

Flight staff performed a series of tests assessing their student's knowledge and skill in the fundamentals of cadet life at the beginning of encampment and again just prior to graduation. This helps to determine each individual cadet's level of growth and is a useful tool to track their growth from where they started to where they'll be at by the end of encampment.



At successful encampments, such as Wisconsin Wing Encampment, leaders should expect that cadets will learn and grow as a result of the encampment experience. Initial assessments helps cadets learn because it enables the flight staff to get a sense of "where each cadet is at" upon arrival at encampment and to make informed choices about what material they should emphasize during flight commander's time, drill and ceremonies, and general training.
